Director's Welcome

2024 illustrated, once again, the cost of non-cooperation, regionally and globally, for citizens worldwide. This cost can be calculated by the lost lives of thousands of people in armed conflicts, and by the cost in terms of poverty and quality of life of multiples of these numbers. It only strengthens our conviction that in the interdependent world we live, there is no alternative for (horizontal) multilateral and regional cooperation and (vertical) multilevel governance.

How this can be done by taking regional context into account, what can be learned from success stories and failures, how impact of regional policies can be assessed, how supranational and sub-national regions can play a role in multi-level governance contexts, are all questions that are at the core of the research and capacity-building activities at UNU-CRIS, with its unique comparative perspective, pluralistic character, and global mandate.

In 2024, UNU-CRIS has further consolidated its activities and produced impactful output, of which you will find a summary here in this Annual Report. The highlights include: the 1st edition of our Doctoral School on Asian and Comparative Regionalism, the co-organisation of highlevel interregional dialogues (EU-LAC, EU-AU), our presence at the 2024 COPs, 5 PhD defences, to name just a few.

We have also started to roll-out the new UNU strategy to increase our presence worldwide. MoUs were signed (or are being negotiated) with UN-ECLAC and universities in Latin America, Africa and Asia. Our aim is to upgrade these collaborations to UNU hubs soon.

2024 was also a record year: we have never had so many visitors (22 visiting researchers, 29 interns), and so many associate research fellows (45). External research funding has never been higher since the introduction of the new governance structure in 2016 (67% of core funding in 2024). This all points to the unaltered relevance of our work.

Finally, the RIKS and Economic Interactions clusters, which already worked closely together, have merged into the Economic and Political Interactions (EPI) cluster. The cluster will continue its work on the economic aspects of regionalism, the impact and effectiveness of regional policies and institutions, and will continue its transversal function within UNU-CRIS of data collection and quantitative methods knowledge centre, as well as the maintenance of the RIKS platform.

Handbook of Regional **Cooperation and Integration**

Regional cooperation and integration are more important than ever.

The world is confronted with a series of overlapping 'poly-crises', including the COVID-19 pandemic, climate change, and military conflicts. These crises highlight the importance of effective cooperation at the regional level as a key component in finding solutions.

Beyond addressing the importance of cooperation for its own sake, it is also important to consider a series of policy areas where regional cooperation is vital. These include trade. security, human rights, environmental protection, digital governance, migration, and health.

The Handbook of Regional Cooperation and Integration, edited by Philippe De Lombaerde and published by Edward Elgar Publishing, offers a detailed cross-policy assessment on the need, locale and impact of regional cooperation and integration, addressing how the principles of regional integration have affected multi-level governance and subsequent public policy.

This book, comprised of 22 chapters examining different policy areas, responds to three fundamental questions: 'Why do we need regional cooperation and integration?', 'Where has it been implemented?', and 'What does the empirical evidence tell us about its effectiveness and impact?'


> It not only looks at why regional cooperation and integration are important, but also at where it has been implemented and what the outcomes and effects are.

In doing so, it covers regional cooperation and integration worldwide, and it includes cases from the African Union, ASEAN, the Eurasian Economic Union, the European Union, and others.

The book is also another illustration of the value of intra-UNU collaboration, involving in

this case contributions from UNU-CRIS. UNU-INRA, UNU-MERIT and UNU-IIGH, as well as from UNESCO.

Its in-depth study of practical applications makes this also suitable for public officials in the sector, as well as regional organisations and think tank staff.

First Doctoral School on Asian and Comparative Regionalism

HIGHLIGHTS

Asia has long been a rich source of study for regionalism scholars. Its blending of aspects from different regional projects around the world gives it a distinct profile and, as Asia continues to grow in global importance, understanding the fluid dynamics of regional integration and cooperation in the region, and how they compare to other regions around the world, will be vital.

DIRECTOR'S

WELCOME

To address the need for high-quality scholars in the region, in 2024 we upgraded what was previously our Summer School on Asian and Comparative Regionalism to a doctoral programme, adapting our doctoral school model that has thrived in Ecuador for more than a decade. For the inaugural edition, UNU-CRIS, together with our partners Airlangga University (Indonesia), the International School of Economics at Magsut Narikbayev University (Kazakhstan), and the International Forum on the Future of Constitutionalism (North America), welcomed 29 students from nine countries to Surabaya for a week-long programme that focused on providing new knowledge through multidisciplinary lectures and shaping their ongoing research through personalised tutorial sessions for each student.



This programme fills a gap for researchers looking for short-course training on regionalism in the region, and contributes to a better understanding of world's most populous region.

Defining the Paradiplomacy Research Agenda

In our complex, interconnected world, diplomacy is no longer solely the domain of nation states. Subnational regions and cities, like Flanders, California and Shanghai are increasingly developing their diplomatic efforts, bypassing traditional diplomatic structures and forging new ones, reflecting the growing importance and power of subnational regions and cities.

To help contribute to this growing scholarship and to identify and shape the research agenda, we organised a roundtable on 19 April in Brussels, together with the Flanders Chancellery and Foreign Office and the University of Lodz, to discuss the priorities for ongoing research and the missing pieces in current paradiplomacy research.

Seven leading paradiplomacy scholars shared their views on guiding questions such as what are interesting/priority research avenues for the paradiplomacy research agenda for the coming years, which novel research questions should be addressed (and why), and in which direction should the scope of paradiplomacy studies expand?

Africa's Perspectives Unpacking the AU-EU Partnership

Africa and Europe are undergoing major transformations in demography, economics, and security domains. The global system's foundational principles and decision-making processes are also increasingly questioned. In this context, the partnership between Africa and the EU continues to be crucial in addressing mutual expectations and aspirations.

To explore this further, we organised a workshop on 28 November with the European Institute for Security Studies (EUISS) to gather diverse perspectives on the AU-EU partnership and provide recommendations on how the partnership should evolve, considering sub-regional perspectives, sectoral differences, and better alignment of mutual expectations and feasibility.

Regions and Cities Governance Lab (Re-LAB)

In 2024, global governance experienced setbacks and fragmentation but also new impetus, notably through the Pact for the Future and a continuous expansion of activities by both subnational and supranational actors. The Regions and Cities Governance Lab followed these developments closely and contributed to debates on the evolution of regionalism and interregionalism.

As part of our mission to bridge the gap between research and practice, we were involved in several policy dialogues, notably on cognitive biases in the relationship between the African Union and the European Union, and on climate interregionalism between Europe and Latin

America. To foster comparative regionalism in the Global South, Re-LAB was also heavily involved in the two UNU-CRIS doctoral schools in Ecuador and Indonesia.

Our Unit on Non-Traditional Diplomacy (UNTRAD) continued its activities with a special focus on science diplomacy.

2025 is set to further accelerate tectonic shifts in the global environment, and Re-LAB will continue to analyse how regional actors respond to them.

Economic and Political Interactions

Because of the substantial overlap in topics and associated researchers, the Economic Interactions cluster merged in 2024 with the RIKS cluster, enabling the pooling of resources and simplifying UNUCRIS' structure.

The newly formed cluster has been exceptionally active, fostering a vibrant research environment with frequent presentations of ongoing work at internal seminars and international conferences.

In 2024, the cluster doubled its number of PhD Researchers from three to six. Their research addresses the complexities of the "spaghetti bowl" of regional integration, explores citizen participation in regional

organisations (ROs), and investigates trade agreements' direct and indirect impacts. We also welcomed eight new interns and several visiting researchers, broadening the cluster's academic and professional network

A notable highlight of the year was the organisation of a conference on the localisation of the SDGs. This event was a collaborative effort with the Brussels office of Waseda University, ULB and UNU-IAS.


THE SDG MONITOR

In collaboration with the Vereniging van Vlaamse Steden en Gemeenten (VVSG) and IDEA Consult, UNU-CRIS developed a comprehensive index and website to monitor the SDG readiness of Flemish municipalities.

This initiative is designed to empower municipalities with the necessary tools and resources to assess, monitor, and enhance their progress towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The 2024 SDG Monitor serves as a pivotal policy instrument, guiding local municipalities in their endeavours to meet the SDGs.

The Monitor encompasses data on 208 indicators that comprehensively detail the socioeconomic and environmental outcomes of all 285 Flemish municipalities.

These indicators, selected based on their relevance to Flemish municipalities and their capacity to measure specific development outcomes, facilitate municipalities in comparing their scores to a diverse range of pertinent groups. Furthermore, the SDG tool (www.sdgmonitor.be) enables municipalities to establish a baseline expectation based on their income, population, and other attributes over the past decade.



Migration and Social Policy

In 2024, the Migration and Social Policy cluster saw the successful completion of three PhD research projects, and also welcomed three new researchers focusing on migration aspirations, geopolitics within social welfare policy and return mobilities between Belgium and Ukraine.

This year, the cluster significantly strengthened its collaboration with associate fellows, which, in most of the cases, are former staff who now climbed up to post-doctoral level or assistant professorships at a diversity of research institutes in Africa, Asia and Europe.

Research mobility in the context of data collection on internal displacement and

youth (im)mobility and the context of data dissemination was another focus of several cluster members. First publications on these data sets are expected in the course of 2025.

Finally, also important steps have been taken to strengthen the social policy research in the cluster, through dedicated seminars and broadening the cluster's research network on this topic.

Nature, Climate and Health

In 2024, the Nature, Climate and Health Cluster amplified its impact by strategically engaging stakeholders and utilising new technology to enhance research and policy recommendations.

Our primary thematic domains of focus were cross-border water security, climate action, public health policies, and diplomacy, aligned with the SDGs.

Through our work, we fostered global and regional partnerships, particularly related to natural resources management and climate change adaptation, to study how multi-level governance operates in these spaces by analysing data and facilitating discussions.

The capacity-building agenda of the cluster attracted young professionals and promoted interdisciplinary research across geographical and gender domains, with a focus on candidates from the Global South.



Digital Governance at UNU-CRIS grew in 2024, with the addition of new members from Ghent University and different departments in the VUB (LSTS and SMIT).

Our team has also solidified relations with external partners, including the Journal 'Policy & Internet' and the academic communities 'Giganet' and GIG-ARTS.

In 2025, we aim to consolidate our position as a hub for research, engaging with partners to develop knowledge-based impacts. We hope to engage more with expertise in regions such as Latin America, Western Asia, and South East Asia, in order to engage globally.

In terms of content, our focus in 2024 was on regional digital governance, digital sovereignty, and participation in multistakeholder organisations. We also addressed AI governance questions and examined policies around disinformation.






Visiting Researchers and Interns



Partnerships With Mexican Research Institutions

A key component of the revitalised United Nations University Strategy 2025–2029 is greater visibility and impact through expansion and outreach. In service of this priority, UNU-CRIS is exploring the creation of research hubs in various regions around the world.

In August, Philippe De Lombaerde visited Mexico City, a natural hub for the promotion of research activities on North and Central American regionalisms and home to a rich and international community of regionalism scholars spread over several institutions.

During this visit, initial MoUs were signed with UN ECLAC and Centro de Investigación y Docencia Económicas (CIDE) and contacts were established at Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México (CIALC) and El Colegio de México, in a first step towards developing a lasting and impactful UNU-CRIS presence in the country and the region.



Academic Council on the United Nations System (ACUNS) Annual Meeting

Eight UNU-CRIS researchers took part in the 2024 Academic Council on the United Nations System (ACUNS) Annual Meeting on Global Governance and Sustainable Development: Revitalizing Research to Support Multilateral Solutions.

They were involved in several panels and roundtables, covering topics such as crossborder cooperation, urban resilience, African Union peace and security initiatives, conflict early warning systems, climate change and public health, health and human security, gender health inequalities, and migrant citizenship.

This year's edition was held in Tokyo (and online) from 20-22 June and was co-hosted at UNU and the University of Tokyo.

Tshilidzi Marwala, Rector of the United Nations University and Under-Secretary-General of the United Nations, delivered the Opening Keynote Address on the topic of Multilateral Solutions Through Research, Technology, and Innovation.

The main aim of the working groups is to bring together the relevant stakeholders in an innovative format, to develop jointly recommendations in a co-creation process, expected to be released in early 2025.

Sophie presented her work on constructivist/relational approaches to (digital)-sovereignty, and Jamal was the discussant of a panel that examined the right of data portability in China, and cyberspace as a new sphere of oppositional struggle in Iran.

Giganet aims to foster multidisciplinary research on internet governance, and the symposium plays a crucial role in shaping discussions, policies, and research directions in the field of internet governance, bringing together academics, practitioners, and policymakers from around the world.

On October 31, Dimpho Deleglise was a panelist in the FES-AU Cooperation Office/Amani Africa policy dialogue on the theme *The Future of Peace Support Operations in Africa*.

She shared her insights on the topic with special emphasis on the protection of civilians and women and peace and security issues in peace support operations.

On December 13, Berna Akcali Gur took part in a workshop co-organised by UNU-CRIS and the Lodz Cyber Hub (LCH) at the University of Lodz Law School, which was held to examine regional approaches to the governance of Critical Internet Infrastructure (CII).

The workshop raised in-depth discussions on the unique legal frameworks adopted in Europe and China, analysing the challenges and opportunities each region faces in the protection and management of CII.

By comparing these governance models, the workshop provided insights into their effectiveness and adaptability within the broader context of international law.

The hydrological cycle of the Amazon has significantly intensified over the past two decades, resulting in more frequent and severe flooding and droughts.

In the framework of *Amazon Week* 2024, we organised a roundtable on 26 September to facilitate a collaborative dialogue among stakeholders and to identify actionable strategies that address governance challenges and enhance community resilience in the Amazon River Basin.

KRAFT Conference: Can We Cooperate?

Philippe De Lombaerde was invited to attend the 10th International Kraft Conference, held in Kőszeg, Hungary from 02-04 December.

The conference, titled *Can We Cooperate*, aimed to address the challenges, achievements and opportunities of cultural heritage-based urban and regional development, through international examples to local best practices.

The discussions covered regional science in the light of domestic and cross-border cooperation, history of Kraft's development through national and international projects, and plans for the future with a focus on knowledge hubs. Philippe De Lombaerde presented on the Comparative Regionalism research programme.

Responding and Adapting to Climate Change in the European Union and in Latin America and the Caribbean

The 2023 high-level EU-CELAC Summit made climate change a priority for EU-LAC cooperation. However, policymaking and implementation have so far fallen short of expectations.

On 7 November, UNU-CRIS, in partnership with the EU-LAC Foundation, the Université libre de Bruxelles and the Pontifical Catholic University of Rio de Janeiro. organised a policy dialogue to discuss cooperation between Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) and the European Union (EU) in finding common solutions to environmental and climate change problems.

The event, which was carried out in the framework of EU-LAC's seventh Annual Call for the co-organisation of events on strategic topics, explored the opportunities and challenges for bi-regional cooperation between the European Union (EU) and Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC) in addressing climate change, renewing alliances and providing recommendations to policymakers.

It generated useful recommendations aimed at international organisations and policymakers, bolstering the argument for deeper EU-LAC joint efforts to tackle the worldwide climate challenge.

A policy brief summarising the principal findings and recommendations is planned for future release.

This research report by Samuel Lietaer, Nidhi Nagabhatla, Charlotte Scheerens, Max Mycroft and Philippe De Lombaerde presents a strategic assessment of the gaps in Belgian flood risk governance following the 2021 summer floods in Western Europe.

The catastrophic floods of July 2021 in Belgium's Walloon Region underscored the critical need to comprehensively evaluate the country's flood risk governance. Through qualitative discourse analysis and stakeholder engagement, the report's assessment identifies critical governance gaps that exacerbated the impact of the floods.



In this policy brief, Peter De Smedt and Flo Van den Broeck of the Flemish Chancellery and Foreign Office Department explore the importance of integrating strategic foresight through a multi-level perspective, and outline methods to achieve this, drawing upon best practices from Flanders

One key highlight is an explanation of how Flanders uses four key functions in its strategic foresight work – discover, explore, map and create, to navigate and ensure evidence-informed policymaking.



PUBLICATION

De Kwetsbaarheid van de Belgische Productieketen: Identificatie van Kritieke In-En Uitvoergoederen

This report by Michel Dumont, Bernhard Michel, and Glenn Rayp uses detailed Belgian trade data to show that aggregated data misrepresents import/export dependencies. They found that Belgium's non-EU import reliance remained stable (2014-2023), with export growth in nonstrategic goods. China leads in nonstrategic imports, while the US dominates strategic, structural goods.

ADVISORY ROLE

Evaluation of HOWEST's Business Management Programme

Pascale Vantorre was invited to share her insights during an external audit of HOWEST's Business Management Department.

She took part in a panel that discussed and examined the quality of students produced by the Business Management programme, based on her experience of supervising several students who have conducted traineeships at UNU-CRIS as part of their study programme.

Localising the Sustainable Developments Goals

On 18–19 September, UNU-CRIS co-organised a workshop on SDG localisation in Brussels with UNU-IAS, ULB and Waseda University Brussels Office.

It brought together researchers and practitioners from Asia and Europe to discuss adapting the goals to the needs and priorities of a given region or community while aligning with national and global frameworks.
